The Gospel of the Apostle and Evangelist Luke. The day after the leaving-taking (the *Apodosis*) of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, the Byzantine Churches both Catholic and Orthodox begin the reading of the Gospel of Saint Luke that will continue until the Great Fast. Luke was a companion of Saint Paul on some of his missionary journeys. Eusebius, a Roman church historian of Greek descent, writes that Luke was

«by birth an Antiochene and by profession a physician». When Luke wrote his twovolume set, composed of a gospel and the Acts of the Apostles, is difficult to establish. Most scholars speculate around the middle of a.D. 67 or sometime later.

Luke had two goals in mind when writing his gospel: first, it was for the benefit of the Church, and just as importantly, for the non – Jewish or Gentile world, which was becoming more and more interested in this new religious movement that seemed to so many, especially the Roman government, as a politically subversive or revolutionary sect. So Luke writes about the historical Jesus and His Church, but he also wants to present this new Faith in a way that one and all may want to belong to it. There are at least main six points that Luke wishes his readers or listeners to know about the Church's faith:

- 1. In a world filled with despair and misery, oppression and injustice, **joy** is a chief hallmark of the Kingdom of God.
- 2. Jesus, in continuity w/ the traditions of His Jewish faith, has a preferential concern for the **poor**, and as a corollary, stresses the spiritual dangers of wealth.
- **3.** Luke greatly emphasizes the importance of **prayer**, another feature of the Kingdom of God.
- 4. The work of the **Holy Spirit** is central in the life of Jesus and His Church.
- 5. Being «by profession a physician», Luke portrays Jesus as the Great **Physician**, the **Healer** of our souls and bodies.
- 6. Lastly, Jesus is **BOTH** «the glory of Israel **AND** a light of revelation to the Gentiles». Jesus has come to save all. The call to theosis is universal.

There is nothing about Jesus and those who follow *«The Way»* that is treasonable or politically dangerous; and Romans like Theophilus – mentioned in the prologue to the gospel – need not be afraid to believe in Christ and belong to His Church.



Our Venerable Father Nilus, Founder and Hegumen of Grottaferrata Monastery, Italy is commemorated on this day.

The **Exarchic Monastery of Santa Maria in Grottaferrata**, also known as

the **Greek Abbey of Saint Nilus**, was founded in 1004 by a group of monks from Calabria led by St. Nilus of Rossano, a charismatic leader and a very important figure of his time. When St. Nilus, the monks' spiritual father, died shortly after founding the Abbey, St. Bartholomew the Younger, his favorite disciple and cofounder of the monastery, assumed their leadership. We, monks who follow the teachings of St. Nilus and St. Bartholomew still live and work within the walls of this ancient Abbey. We are **Catholics of the Byzantine-Greek rite** and belong to the **Order of Basilian Monks**, established by the Catholic Church for all Byzantine-rite monasteries in Italy. Today, Grottaferrata is the last of the many Byzantine-Greek monasteries that dotted Sicily,



southern Italy and Rome itself in the Middle Ages. It is also unique in that, having been founded fifty years before the Great Schism that divided Catholics and Orthodox, it remained in communion with the Church of Rome while preserving the Byzantine rite and monastic tradition of its founders.

Dear parishioners of St Mary Byzantine Catholic Church,

When Pope Francis announced his visit to the United States, he filled millions of Americans with joy. I'm definitely one of them. And I'm sure you are as well. At Catholic Near East Welfare Association (CNEWA), we're helping local churches and religious sisters look after these innocent people. But we desperately need your helping hand.
