

The events in Newtown, Connecticut have horrified all of us. As adults, the news is difficult to process, emotionally and intellectually. It's worse than the worst possible nightmare. How would we console one of those parents who has lost a child? What would we say? And if as adults we are having difficulties with finding the right words; imagine how difficult it is for our children to process these events. What's more, words at a time like this are most inadequate anyway. So we direct our words to Another.

Our Church has asked us to pray for the victims. Pray for them. Pray for those families who must somehow try to mend their lives after such an unthinkable day. All the age old questions come to

the fore: Why does God allow such things to happen? Where was God? There are no easy answers; philosophers have struggled with these questions for millennia. Where do we as Christians start to look for answers? We start with "In the beginning, God created... and everything that He had made was good." The opening stories from Genesis help us to realize that the world's current condition was not caused by God, but by humanity. God made a beautiful world. He asked us to be stewards of that beauty, but we messed it up and as a result the beauty of the world has been marred, defaced, disfigured; the world has become a place full of pain, violence, death. The real blame falls on us; we are not living as God wants us to live.

The question may not be why does God allow such horrific events to take place, but why do we allow them to occur? Why aren't we more involved with the issues of our world, trying to restore it to a semblance of what God wanted from the beginning? Where was God at that 9:30 AM on 14 December? He was probably with the adults who put themselves in harm's way and sacrificed themselves to protect the children in their care. He was with the teacher who, fearing they would soon die, tearfully told her students that she loved them so that those words would be the last thing that they would hear. He was in the policemen who could not fathom what they were dealing with and yet went about doing what they had been trained to do – their job. God was in all these moments and many more.

Many commentators these days have pointed to the prevalence of violence in our society, from "entertainment" to video games. Perhaps, this could result in you as a family and community making the following resolution between now and at least the Feast of Theophany January 6th or beyond. Turn off and put away the violent video games. If they are still wrapped in Christmas packages, return them and replace them with something else. Don't watch television or movies with excessive, pointless, or gratuitous violence. Think of it as abstaining from certain forms of "entertainment," just as we abstain from certain kinds of food for specified periods of time.



Matthew 1:25, the last verse of today's gospel, has a couple of phrases that need some clarification. «...and [Joseph] did not know her **till** she had brought forth her

firstborn Son...» (1) The use of "till" does not imply that Joseph had marital relations with Mary after the Savior's birth. In the Bible, this word (sometimes translated 'to') is often used to express a situation that actually continues after the event mentioned [See Matt. 28:20; Gen. 8:7; Deut 34:6; 2Kg 6:23]. The witness of the entire Church throughout



history is that Mary remained a virgin for life. **(2)** The term **firstborn** does not imply that Mary had additional children, but only that no child was born <u>BEFORE</u> Jesus. The firstborn son is traditionally the primary heir and recipient of blessings. Christ is the firstborn over all creation, and thus the firstborn of the dead.
