**HISTORICAL NOTE:** Friday (April 11<sup>th</sup>) marks the end of the 40 Fast before Christ's Pascha / Passover. In origin this fast seems to be an imitation of the 40 day fast Jesus made immediately after His baptism in the Jordan. In Egypt, it prepared the catechumens for the reception of baptism on the fortieth day after Theophany. Today it is done immediately before Pascha and concludes with a day of baptism on Lazarus Saturday (April 12<sup>th</sup>). Great and Holy Week remains as a period of six days of even more intense prayer and fasting as an immediate preparation for Pascha, perhaps originating in the Jewish Week of Unleavened Bread, which was understood as a time of fasting. The Paschal Fast of Holy Week, therefore, is more ancient than that of the Great Forty-Day Fast.



When Mary was only twelve years old, she left her parents and departed to Alexandria, where she lived a depraved life for seventeen years. Then, moved by curiosity, she went with many pilgrims to Jerusalem, that she might see the Exaltation of the venerable Cross. Even in the Holy City she gave herself over to every kind of licentiousness and drew many into the depth of perdition. Desiring to go into the church on the day of the Exaltation of the Cross, time



and again she perceived a certain invisible power preventing her entrance, whereas the multitude of people about her entered unhindered. Therefore, wounded in heart by this, she decided to change her way of life and reconcile herself to God by means of repentance. Invoking our Lady the Theotokos as her protectress, she asked her to open the way for her to worship the Cross, and vowed that she would renounce the world. And thus, returning once again to the church, she entered easily. When she had worshipped the precious Wood, she departed that same day from Jerusalem and passed over the Jordan. She went into the inner wilderness and for forty-seven years lived a most harsh manner of life, surpassing human strength; alone, she prayed to God alone. Toward the end of her life, she met a certain hermit named Zosimas, and she related to him her life from the beginning. She requested of him to bring her

the immaculate Mysteries that she might partake of them. According to her request, he did this the following year on Holy and Great Thursday. One year after this, Zosimas again went thither and found her dead, laid upon the ground, and letters written in the sand near her which said: "Abba Zosimas, bury here the body of wretched Mary. I died on the very day I partook of the immaculate Mysteries. Pray for me." Her death is reckoned by some to have taken place in 378, by some, in 437, and by others, in 522. She is commemorated twice in the liturgical year: on April 1<sup>st</sup> and on the Fifth Sunday of the Great Fast. Her life was recorded by Saint Sophronius of Jerusalem.



#### CAN I BE A BYZANTINE CATHOLIC WITHOUT GOING TO CHURCH?

#### Yes, of course! It is just as possible as being:

- A student who does not go to school.
- An employee who does not go to work.
- A soccer player who does not show up for a match.
- A soldier who deserts the army.
- A teacher who never shows up for class.
- A musician who will not practice or go to rehearsals / concerts.
- A baseball player who stays in the locker room.
- A citizen who is unpatriotic.

#### Our Church is our home base for serving Christ and one another in our life.

The **Catechism of the Catholic Church**, in describing the Sunday Obligation, states that *«The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, [...] Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin.» (CCC 2181). The three conditions for a sin to be considered 'mortal' are grave matter (it is a serious wrong), knowledge (you know or should know that it is wrong), and consent (you have to freely choose it, even though you know it is wrong). A Catholic in such a state CANNOT receive the Eucharist until he or she has received sacramental absolution from a priest in the Mystery of Holy Confession. By receiving Holy Communion without prior confession one does not receive the grace of the sacrament AND commits another grave or mortal sin.* 

You cannot pray at home as at church, where there is a great multitude, where exclamations are cried out to God as from one great heart, and where there is something more: the union of minds, the accord of souls, the bond of charity, the prayers of the priests.
